

Precautions from the board

- Collecting emergency numbers.

Prospective members wishing to register will be asked on the form for an emergency number. This number can only be used during an AKTivity if needed. Examples are in case of an accident where the member wants a caregiver to be called for help, reassurance, etc.

- Training of Emergency response officers.

AKT may train up to 4 Emergency response officers from the board at the beginning of each board year. These Emergency response officers are trained in first aid, CPR and fire safety. Should something happen during an AKTivity, it is always possible to call in the Emergency response officers, they will further know what to do.

- MHFA training.

The AKT board has the option of taking MHFA (Mental Health First Aid) training. MHFA'ers are trained to recognize signs of mental forces and refer people to appropriate help when deemed necessary, both in crisis and non-crisis situations.

- VCP

AKT has 1 or 2 confidential contact persons. These are there for members who want to say something about possible events within the association. You can also contact the VCP for things that happen outside the association. The VCP will pass this on to the current board who will deal with it accordingly.

What to do in case of an emergency?

- Unpleasant event within the association

If something happens to a fellow member, you can always discuss this with the AKT VCP. Above all, see what you feel comfortable with.

- Unpleasant event during an AKT activity

Should something happen during an AKT activity, don't be afraid to go to the board. You can always go to the VCP or a board member later, as long as you are comfortable with it. They are trained to try to help you.

- Accident during an AKTivity

Should you get hurt or see someone get hurt? If so, get 1 or more of the FAFS personnel to help. They will know what to do next.

In case of emergency, call the national emergency number 112. If the emergency occurs on University property call the University emergency number 030-253 4444, they will signal FAFS officers who are nearby. These will attend the scene as soon as possible. They will also call the national emergency services and inform them of the situation.
